

Looking back at 2021





A year full of challenges

In 2021 CARE Germany supported around 3.8 million people in 130 projects and 45 countries, focusing on life-saving emergency aid, pandemic response, strengthening healthcare, hygiene, food security as well as gender equality. We were particularly active in two regions: 33 percent of our projects were implemented in Africa, 44 percent in the Middle East.

Also in 2021, the world did not get any rest: the year marked the tenth anniversary of the war in Syria where CARE teams continued to provide aid under the most difficult conditions. We were active in Yemen as well: In the world's worst humanitarian crisis, CARE is one of the few aid organizations that reliably stand with the people. And our focus went again to Afghanistan, where the change of power in August brought fear and insecurity to the Afghani population.

Once again, violence erupted in Ethiopia in 2021: Millions of people were forced to leave their homes due to the conflict

in the Tigray region. In particular women and girls suffered from the outbreaks of violence, because in times of war and crisis and as refugees, they are usually the first to experience violence and abuse. Therefore, CARE puts them at the center of its work, for example by creating safe spaces and providing medical and psychosocial support.

COVID-19 continued to impact our work in the second pandemic year: devastating corona outbreaks, for example in India and Nepal in the spring of 2021, challenged our emergency response tremendously. And yet once again, international solidarity saved lives: Thanks to the support of our donors, urgently needed intensive care beds could be provided and further material and personnel for hospitals were financed.

Financial


Development

In 2021, CARE Germany recorded 62.9 million euros in revenues. Compared to 2020, this is an increase of 2.4 million euros. Our program expenses amounted to 61.4 million euros. 54.5 percent of the revenues came from institutional donors. In 2021, our major donors included the German Federal Ministry for Economic Cooperation and Development, the German Federal Foreign Office as well as the European Union.

CARE International Balkans implemented 15 poverty-fighting development and humanitarian aid projects that reached 162,184 direct participants. We focused on the areas gender equality, humanitarian action, right to health, right to food, water and nutrition, women's economic justice as well as the humanitarian response to the COVID-19 pandemic. We thank our main donors in the Balkans, the Austrian Development Cooperation, the Swiss Development Cooperation, Oak Foundation, the Czech Development Cooperation, the German Federal Ministry for Economic Cooperation and Development, the German Federal Foreign Office and the European Union.

With 15 projects in 2021 CARE International Iraq focused on humanitarian assistance and durable solutions. In total we supported 603,129 people. We worked mainly in IDP camps and returnee areas and engaged in the sectors livelihoods, food security, health including sexual reproductive health and rights, COVID-19 protection and prevention, water infrastructure and hygiene promotion as well as protection with a special focus on gender-based violence. Our work was funded by the Australian Department of Home Affairs, the Australian Department of Foreign Affairs and Trade, Global Affairs Canada, the Czech Ministry of Foreign Affairs, the German Federal Ministry for Economic Cooperation and Development, the German Federal Foreign Office, the Luxembourg Ministry of Foreign Affairs and the CocaCola Foundation.

We are grateful for our strong partnerships with institutional, business, and private donors. At the heart of CARE's work are 64,621 individual donors who placed their trust in us in 2021.


What



For women and more equality

"Because of COVID-19, I lost my job," reported Joan Naisimiu, a single mother from Kenya. "I didn't know how to feed my two children anymore. We were hungry." Like Joan, millions of women in CARE project countries suffered last year: In times of crisis, they ate last and least to provide for their families. They were at the back of the line when it came to education, health services or political participation. Joan was lucky: Thanks to the financial start-up support and training from CARE, she was able to open her own store for cosmetic products and earn money again. She also became a member and treasurer of a CARE Savings and Loan group, where she and other women in her community learned how to save and invest efficiently. CARE remains convinced that empowering women changes the future. Because progress achieved for women is also progress for their family and their entire community. Joan is now optimistic about the future: "My membership in the Savings and Loan group will allow me to expand my business and to provide for my family in the long run."

For climate protection Fighting extreme weather

Millions of people were already suffering from the dramatic consequences of climate change in 2021: Droughts and plagues of locusts in Somalia, severe hunger in Mali or the Democratic Republic of Congo, water shortages in Syria or Iraq - the climate crisis particularly aggravated the situation of the poorest, who were already struggling for survival on a daily basis. CARE was working on both levels: humanitarian aid for relief, but also long-term support for adaptation. We provided basic survival support, supported people to become more resilient and helped mitigate the effects of extreme weather events. Additionally, we tried to change the overall conditions: At the UN climate conference in Glasgow, we did our best to influence decision makers in order to slow down or, in the best case, stop the negative developments.

We put women and girls at the center of our work, because we know that poverty cannot be overcome until all people have equal rights and opportunities.

In 2021, CARE Germany has been responsible for our country offices in Iraq and the Balkans; since 2022 we also manage the CARE operations in Libya and Ukraine. We oversee all operations and support the local teams in personnel and financial planning, security, and logistics.


