



Looking back at 2022 ●

Extracts from CARE Germany's annual report



Global distress, climate crisis and the war in Ukraine

2022 was a challenging year for CARE. More people than ever before needed humanitarian aid. In our focus areas of emergency aid, gender justice and climate crisis, CARE Germany was responsible for 130 projects in 40 countries. In this way, we reached 4.2 million people.

The escalation of the war in Ukraine last year was a painful reminder that peace in Europe could never be taken for granted. CARE has established an office in Lviv in the west of Ukraine and has been providing aid since the beginning of the escalation. In the year under review, we were able to provide direct support to over 600,000 Ukrainians.

With our new location in Ukraine, our support increasingly shifted to (Eastern) Europe in 2022: we implemented almost 38 percent of our projects in Europe, 25 percent in Africa and around 24 percent in the Near and Middle East.

In 2022, we continued to be active where people have been living in conflict zones for years. In Syria, it was the eleventh anniversary of the war. In Yemen, the conflict has been a sad part of people's everyday life for seven years. CARE distributed food and hygiene packages and provided clean water and shelter. For the people in Afghanistan, the situation has also deteriorated again in the past year. With cash distributions, mobile health teams and food security training, CARE continued its support in the country.

The effects of the climate crisis hit many regions worldwide with full force last year. CARE stands with the affected people and provides humanitarian aid. It is our special responsibility not to abandon those who often contribute least to the climate crisis but are hit hardest by its negative consequences.

A heartfelt thank you is therefore directed to all the people who accompany and support our work!

Financial development

In 2022, CARE Germany recorded 79.5 million euros in revenues. Compared to 2021, this is an increase of 16.6 million euros. Our expenditure amounted to 74 million euros. 40,98 percent of the revenues came from institutional donors. CARE has been working with many of them for years. In 2022, our major donors included the German Federal Office, the German Federal Ministry of Economic Cooperation as well as the European Union. Our thanks go to them for their successful cooperation.

Our aim is always to implement the project work as effectively as possible and to use every euro in a targeted manner.

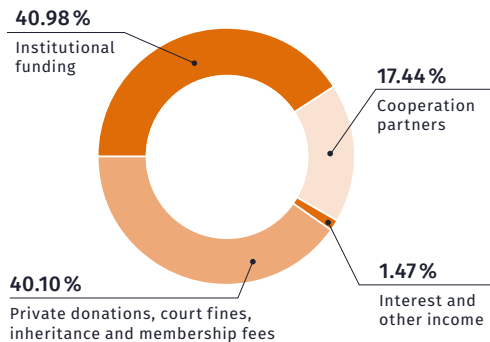
CARE Iraq is currently in a transition phase from emergency aid to development cooperation after the United Nations drew up a final humanitarian needs plan in 2022. The CARE country office is responding to the changed circumstances and realigning its programs, because even if traditional emergency aid is discontinued, the people in the country still need support.

CARE now also has an office in Libya, making it one of the few foreign aid organizations with a presence in the country. The focus is on supporting emergency health services, rehabilitating health facilities, improving access to health centers and training and capacity building for local health staff.

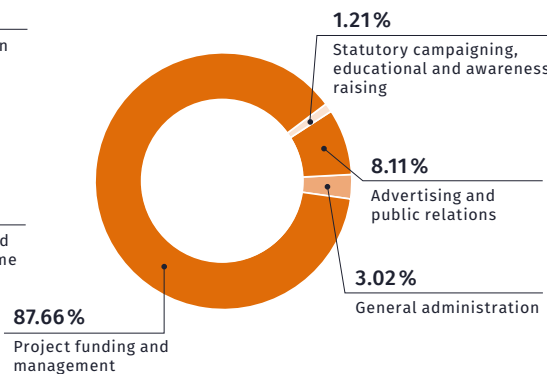
CARE Balkans evaluated their successful Young Men Initiative program in 2022. Young people learn to recognize prevailing gender roles in order to ultimately question them and find alternatives. The program is proving to be a great success. For many of the participants, it has brought about a change of perspective with regard to gender stereotypes.

In Ukraine, CARE has been providing emergency aid since the beginning of the escalation and supporting Ukrainians with the basic necessities of life. Among other things, our teams are distributing relief supplies and equipping medical facilities with materials.

Expenses 2022 by use



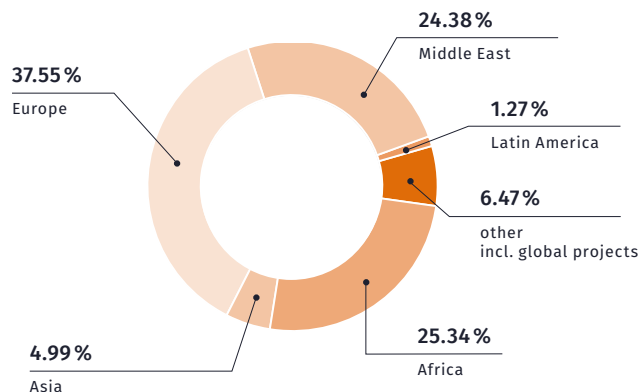
In 2022, CARE Germany provided direct assistance to 4.2 million people in 130 projects and 40 countries.

For climate protection Fighting extreme weather

Layla Ali's house is dusty. The drought in northern Iraq means that sand in the air is a common phenomenon. In her village Eminke, water is a precious commodity. Layla's fields dry up; harvests fail and therefore also the family income. Summers in Iraq are characterized by massive heat. Around 20,000 people have already been displaced by this. In 2022, CARE Germany was active in more than 20 countries on three continents to strengthen people in their fight against the negative effects of climate change. In Iraq, CARE is helping women in particular to adapt as best as they can to the climate crisis. For example, we are rehabilitating water infrastructure and distributing equipment for agricultural use.

For women and more equality

In Ukraine, women, girls, and marginalized groups in particular are struggling with the consequences of war and displacement. Nevertheless, they have shown unwavering solidarity, leadership, and courage over the past year: "There is a strong gender dynamic in this crisis. While women make up the majority of displaced people in Ukraine and neighboring countries, they are also stepping forward to support each other," says Sofía Sprechmann Sineiro, Secretary General of CARE International. National women's organizations as well as representatives of marginalized groups such as the Roma or the LGBTQI+ community know the needs of affected people in their communities best and always have better access to marginalized populations than international players. For this reason, CARE introduced the Women Lead in Emergencies model in Ukraine to specifically strengthen women's organizations. In 2022, CARE partnered with four women's rights organizations and women-led organizations and provide funds for the most urgent humanitarian needs. Subsequently, CARE expanded its support and now focuses on multi-year funding. "After one year, it is more important than ever to sustain our aid," emphasizes Sofía Sprechmann Sineiro.

In 2022, CARE Germany has been responsible for our country offices in Iraq, the Balkans, Libya, and Ukraine. We oversee all operations and support the local teams in all areas of project work, personnel and financial planning, security, and logistics.

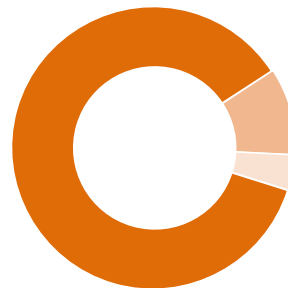

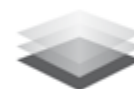
